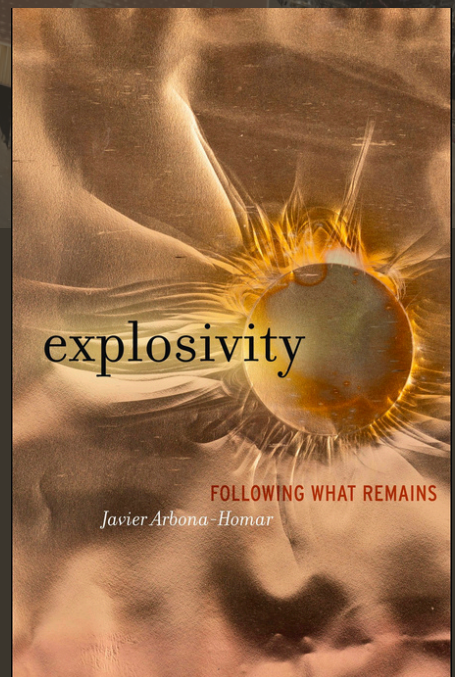

For this second session, **Assistant Professor Javier Arbona-Homar** (he/him, American Studies and Design, UC Davis) will be in dialogue with **Associate Professor Juan Herrera** (he/him, Geography, UCLA). Modeling "listening sessions" organized by *Reparative Memories* throughout the year, this conversation will include a brief talk from Prof. Arbona-Homar- who will discuss his recently published book, *Explosivity: Following What Remains*- followed by a response from Prof. Herrera and an open dialogue with the audience.

Offering a novel approach to contemporary landscape studies, *Explosivity* unearths the hidden legacies of violence that have shaped the physical and cultural environment of the San Francisco Bay area. As he sifts through the historical debris of previous centuries, Prof. Arbona-Homar analyzes a series of explosions that took place between 1866 and 2011 to call attention to the scattered remnants of militarism and racialized capitalism embedded in the region's geography.

He does so by centering the following questions: how does one archive an explosion? And how does one repair in the afterblast and activate what remains?
